# A YEAR IN REVIEW

THE PARKESBURG POINT entered 2021 fearing the worst of the pandemic was still to come. Our budget reflected preparation for the worst. We doubled our nutrition spending, anticipating that we would have to support our community's food needs, and we expanded our intern program to help meet our staffing needs. Little did we know that it would be our community's mental health needs that would require the most attention.

In February of 2021, we lost one of our most promising alumni and this was followed up with a precious 8-year-old who passed away in a car accident. Our community was rattled by both deaths while still enduring the challenges of the pandemic. Many had not returned to work, and most students were in remote or hybrid school, which was incredibly difficult. As we realized the effects of mental health and hybrid learning we proposed to address this issue. Dana Fogg was hired as our academic coordinator; she has reorganized our academic program and is doing a great job helping students to catch up and recover from learning loss. We partnered with therapists and mental health

counselors to support students and families and increased spending in these areas. Students and their families have certified counselors at THE POINT to help with their needs.

Throughout 2021, we learned the importance of supporting one another as we minister to our community. We learned that the work that we do is only possible through God's empowerment, the hard work of our staff and interns, and the support of our volunteers and funders. I trust that this 2021 annual report will be both informative and encouraging to you the readers. We thank God for you and the generosity that you show THE POINT.

## A STUDENT STORY

Investing in The POINT makes a sustainable difference in our community and empowers at-risk youth to break generational cycles of poverty. Continued funding ensures students like Brandon are fed, feel safe and have access to the support and resources necessary to avoid destructive behaviors, increase self-esteem and confidence.

Brandon is in 9th grade and involved in many of our Hands-On-Training classes, including Woodworking, Construction Carpentry; Bicycle Repair; Construction Electric; and RC Car Building. Brandon came into the program with some skills gained from helping his father and uncle. He was a good listener and learned skills quickly. Due to the pandemic and enrollment capacities, The POINT began separating the nights we worked with elementary and post-secondary students. This created opportunities to have older students serve as Junior Leaders. Because of his attention to detail and willingness to listen Brandon was chosen as a Junior

Leader. He excelled and was employed as a High School Intern during the summer.

As an Intern, he was able to work alongside other program participants under the supervision of a contractor to put his hands-on-training skills into action and help build an Art Room. He was involved in studding out the walls, installing, spackling and painting, and installing laminate flooring. His confidence and pride in his work shows whenever someone asks about the Art Room. He has gained both confidence and employable skills. Brandon will continue in the Hands-On -Training Program throughout high school, trying new tools, developing new skill sets and helping to mentor and teach his younger peers. We look forward to seeing him continue to grow in confidence, gain new skillsets and pursue his future goals for college/

trade-school.

#### THE POINT'S PROGRAMS

2021 was a challenging year for everyone but THE POINT's programs thrived. Take a look below at each POINT program and see how we are meeting the needs of the kids and the community with your help.



#### Crisis/Counseling

THE POINT maintains a fund to financially support our students and their families in times of crisis (maximum of once per year.) Because of your generosity, we were able to provide financial assistance to over 54 families in 2021. Some of the areas of need were rent, utility bills, oil/gas, clothing, and food. The foundation of this support is to reduce repetitive traumas and maintain as much stability and security as we can for our students

Many of our students and parents are struggling with emotional issues. Some do not have insurance and cannot pay for counseling services. We are blessed to be able to provide them with the support they need through local counselors. We have an agreement with the

counselors to provide services to these families.





In addition to homework assistance, THE POINT also helps some of our college bound students and interns navigate the college process from applications to choosing classes.

#### Girls Program

The Girls' Program ensures there is direct focus on at-risk pre-teen and teen girls who need discipleship, love, and hope to succeed in their lives now and in the future. One of our largest events is our monthly Girls' Night where approximately 100 girls in grades 2 – 12 attend. Every month has a theme which may include crafts, sports, relay races, food, dancing and art stations, a speaker, and more activities. Girls' Night is very popular, and girls attend from all over Western Chester County. During these evenings, we introduce our weekly **Amy Walton** programming where we provide a variety of activities for girls to explore their interests such as music, science, art, cooking, crafts, and many other diverse activities. Weekly small group Bible studies are split by gender and age so that female students can speak and be heard about issues they are passionate about or may face in the future. We make sure the girls have a voice and the opportunity to be guided spiritually, mentally, and physically. The Girls' program provides opportunities for the girls to experience joy, socialize, discover their gifts, think about their future, and build relationships with peers and adults which may equip them for college,

## Hands On Training Center
